Galleria Vittorio Emanuele II

With its mosaic floors, wrought iron infrastructure, and soaring glass ceilings hosting high-end stores and top-shelf dining venues, The Galleria will take

your shopping in Milano experience to another level. After its inauguration in 1867, it is much more than a shopping arcade and has an air of luxury. There

are also beautiful restaurants, cafes and rooftop for a delight break (Camparino in Galleria is a must!).

Quadrilatero della Moda



The Quadrilatero della Moda lies in the heart of the fashion district of Milano. The square is less touristy than the Galleria but draws huge crowds and big spenders. Via Monte Napoleone

is famous for being one of the most expensive shopping streets in the world, and it dates back to the 1950s but Via Sant'Andrea, Via della Spiga and Via Manzoni are not different since all are

lined with brands like Chanel, Prada and Fendi. There are eye-catching window displays that are worth a visit, even if the price tag is aspirational.

Via Torino



Via Torino connects Piazza del Duomo with the Navigli area. It was once packed with artisans and workshops

but has now become one of the most important areas of Milanese shopping, plenty of shoe shops and several stylish

independent boutiques with a specific focus on the mid-range retail.

04 Corso Buenos Aires



Corso Buenos Aires is the longest shopping street in all of Europe. There are 350 shops spread over more than a kilometer. The Corso, which starts from Piazza Oberdan (Porta Venezia), is a continuation of Corso Venezia and

goes straight on all the way to Piazzale Loreto. It is served by three metro stops at the two ends and halfway on the M1 red line (Porta Venezia, Loreto and Lima). If you have some available free time pause a while on this street, where

the bars and pizzerias will invite you to extend your busy shopping schedule (we suggest to check in Via Melzo, Via Malpighi, via Frisi and via Lambro).

Piazza 5 Giornate e Corso XXII Marzo

A must for Milanese shopping lovers, Corso XXII Marzo: a stone's throw from the famous Piazza Cinque Giornate, born following the Five Days of 1848

and the Unification of Italy, which bears a monument in the center precisely to remember the victory over Radetzky and the Austrians. Also with over

hundreds of shops, it is almost two kilometers long; it is ideal for those who want to accompany their shopping with healthy relaxation.

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
